Ontario Lung Screening Program (OLSP): Screening Patients at High Risk of Lung Cancer

People ages 55 and older may be eligible for screening through the <u>Ontario Lung Screening Program</u> if they meet certain referral criteria and are eligible upon risk assessment.

Referral Criteria:

Referrals for people age 55 to 80 must:

- Have a smoking history of any amount of cigarettes daily for 20 years, and
- Have Ontario Health Insurance Plan (OHIP) coverage

Anyone age 80 or older requires a new referral every year

Referrals for people age 81 or older must:

- Have a smoking history of any amount of cigarettes daily for 20 years
- Have Ontario Health Insurance Plan (OHIP) coverage
- Have discussed the risk and benefits of lung screening with you
- Be well enough to undergo and recover from lung cancer treatment
- Have a lifespan (over 5 years) to benefit from treatment

Access the OLSP referral form <u>here</u>. Not everyone who meets the referral inclusion criteria will be eligible for lung cancer screening in the OLSP.

Exclusion Criteria: People are not eligible for lung cancer screening in the OLSP if they:

- Have been diagnosed with lung cancer or are actively under surveillance for lung nodules
- Have had hemoptysis of unknown cause or unexplained weight loss of more than 5 kg in the past year
- Are undergoing diagnostic assessment, treatment or surveillance for life-threatening conditions (e.g., a cancer with a poor prognosis)

OLSP Risk Re-Assessment: When to re-refer patients who do not qualify for lung cancer screening

- If a patient you referred is told by an OLSP site that they do not qualify for lung cancer screening, you can **re-refer them in 3 years** to have their risk re-assessed.
- If your patient experiences any of the following changes, they can be re-referred for re-assessment at the time of the change:
 - Started smoking again (if they had quit at the time of the assessment)
 - Diagnosed with chronic obstructive pulmonary disease
 - Identified a new family history of lung cancer
